
## **TEACHER TIPS**

## Classroom Management Strategies (Things that I find work)

- The bell does not release them, you do. (train them the first 2 weeks of school and you've got them for the year)
- Randomly choose students to answer questions (put names on poker cards, note cards, roll dice) Have a point chart when they answer it correctly...extra credit! Or class credit. Easily printed from rollsheets.
- Have the "busy" students serve a teacher helpers. Pass out papers, collect papers, etc.
- Kids get restless...if they are nodding off...have them stand up and stretch
- The "Timer" (every time they start talking, start the timer...that's how long they stay after the bell)
- Don't use OCD or referral unless you HAVE to.
- Have them call their mom during class. Hehehe. I love this one.
- Have them sit close to teacher's desk.
- Do not tolerate disrespect but don't be a yeller. The "evil" eye works wonders
- Ask them to stand outside, but don't let them disturb other classes.
- Room cleaners! Keep Windex on hand for those kids that won't fall in line.
- The message (have a "note" that will be given to a teacher...have that student take the note...find a teacher in advance to do this with)
- Send them to another classroom WITH WORK!!!! Don't just send them out for your colleagues to deal with. Book work is just fine.
- Arrange the seating to decrease distractions. I let them choose who to sit by at the beginning of the year then will move them
  if they are disruptive.
- Do NOT tolerate cheating. Cheating = 0. No questions asked. They'll learn after the first time.
- Bell-to-bell: have a warm-up everyday on the board...be prepared if your class doesn't reach the bell...have them do some sort of strategy to burn time. Quick write, brainstorm, drawing, opinion, etc.
- Keep room somewhat organized (a chaotic environment can breed chaos). Be CONSISTENT!!!!!
- A smile goes a long way...so does being yourself. Students can see through it...don't be transparent, be you.
- I've tried the "students write the rules and punishments" without much success but some people like it.
- You can do the "clap once" bit...but I find teenagers get annoyed by it.
- Students LOVE competition...any type of inter or intra class competition is awesome and keeps them motivated.
- Don't let them use ipods or cell phones. Consistency with discipline is key. (If you let them do this and other teachers don't, it causes problems. Don't be a part of the problem.)
- Provide students with a checklist. What it takes to get an A....all the way to an F.
- Give immediate feedback. Quick (5 question/multiple choice) quizzes that can be graded on the spot are awesome!
